



For the past eleven years, Prague has played host to hundreds of prominent international guests who have come to discuss current global issues at the annual Forum 2000 Conference. Among the thought leaders and policymakers who have attended the Conference were, for example, Dalai Lama, Boutrus Boutrus-Ghali, Hillary and Bill Clinton or Madeleine Albright. With as many as 90 delegates, this year was the biggest event in the history of Forum 2000.

The year's theme was "Freedom and Responsibility" and the Conference was traditionally opened by its co-founder, former President Václav Havel. In his speech, Havel drew attention to societies oppressing basic democratic freedoms such as Belorussia or Burma and emphasized the obligation of democratic countries to promote freedom. He also appealed to the audience to take individual responsibility and invited everybody to sign up a petition against the violence in Burma.

During the two days of the Conference, the main theme was debated in four different areas: Freedom and Responsibility in Politics, International Law, Media, and Business. Besides, a number of additional seminars, workshops and roundtables such as Water in Middle East or Interfaith Dialogue completed the extensive programme of Forum 2000. The Conference was closed with a multi-faith meditation at San Salvator Church, where representatives of Islam, Judaism and Christianity lit together a symbolic candle of tolerance and cooperation.

Say IT VITH YOUR BODY!

There is one group of people who are rarely written about in the newspapers even though any prestigious event such as international conferences with VIP participants could not do without them. They are the event coordinaters and the supp orting staff who work hard to make the event a success. A Diplomacy student Tomáš Táborský, who works occasionally as a personal assistant of VIP* delegates at international conferences, is one of them.

...I didn't realize how challenging this job can be and what different problems you might have to face. There are so many factors involved that may turn the things out of hands and very often you find yourself in situations where you just have to play it by ear. For example, the first time I worked as a personal assistant, my delgate's luggage was lost by the airline and the delegate arrived at the conference not only without his cloth and all personal belongings but also without his speech which he had prepared for the opening ceremony. The delegate tried to keep his hair on but you can imagine how upset he was. Luckily, the airline sent the luggage on the next plane so all got sorted out in the end.

Other time my delegate, who was an elderly lady, forgot her purse with her medicine in the taxi. She got very nervous and started losing her head. I tried to calm her down and called the taxi company immediately. Unfortunately, they didn't have any information about the purse but promised to call back as soon as they get some. At that moment I put my foot in it by asking her what type of medicine she takes. The delegate got very emotional and started telling me all about her health problems and complaining about me for not keeping an eye on the purse. lust when she was crying at me that I wouldn't lift a finger to help her, my mobile phone rang. It was the taxi company saying that they found the purse and they would bring it in a few minutes. The delegate relaxed immediately and apologized for Losing her face and being unfair to me.

One of the things I've learned in this job is that you always have to keep your head and be ready for everything. Another important lesson I took to heart is that VIPs are only humans and have their weak sides like everybody else. You have to treat them with respect but don't get carried away - keep your feet on the ground."

Among the many discussions of this year's Forum 2000 Conference was the roundtable dedicated to Freedom and Responsibility in Media. Many panelists including former Slovak Ambasador to Poland and current Member of Parliment Magdaléna Vašáryová expressed their discontent with media's lack of responsibility, be it individual reporters or media as a whole. She finds it alarming that nowadays media are more interested in gossip rather than serious journalism. Read the following interview and discuss:

Mrs Albite: What a surprising question again...Considering that my day usually starts at 6am and rarely finishes before midnight, I'm a bit of both, I suppose.

Reporter: Right. I can see time is pressing on us and so is my empty stomache, ha ha...so here comes my last question: If you were the reporter and I were you, what question would you ask in this moment?

Mrs Albite: Excuse me???

Reporter: I know, it's a bit unusual but I've always had a weakness for originality.

Mrs Albite: In that case my question would be, have you ever had such a sitly interview? And the answer would be NO.
